Precious, Priceless Water

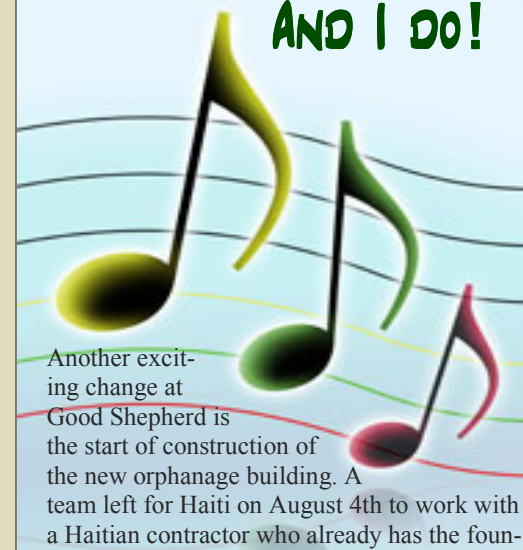


On the hot summer days, most of us don't think twice when we get a nice cold drink of water from the faucet. In Haiti, however, 80% of the water is not drinkable. Good Shepherd Orphanage gets its water from a commu-

nity well a block away. Now, through a generous donation by North County Christ the King Church (NCCTK) in Lynden, Washington, we now have the resources to drill our own well and get water "on demand." No more lugging five-gallon water buckets!

The community well only provides enough water for cooking. Washing dishes, clothes, and bathing is currently done in the river, which is the same place trucks, motorcycles, and animals are washed. With a well on site, the children will have readily available clean water, which is so necessary for their good health. The well will also provide water for the new bathrooms being built, irrigation for a garden and farm animals, as well as having water for washing clothes. We are so thankful to NCCTK for this donation. This one gesture is literally having a global impact.

Another exciting change at Good Shepherd is the start of construction of the new orphanage building. A team left for Haiti on August 4th to work with a Haitian contractor who already has the foundation in. Our goal is to have walls up and ready for the roof by mid-October. Currently the children sleep on the floor. It's too crowded for even cots. The new building, however, will allow for each child to have his or her own bed. How exciting for them! And so much more comfortable when the rainy season arrives in the fall.

The Haitian contractor employs 8 or 9 local men to work on the construction. Since gainful employment is so rare anywhere in Haiti, this opportunity presents a win-win situation for the workers and our orphanage. They can take pride in earning money for their families and we benefit from their labor with a wonderful new building. The work is not as important as the relationships we forge. We hope to always offer people ways to help themselves. This fosters a sense of pride and community.

Praise to God for all the improvements we're making at Good Shepherd Orphanage. It's all for His Kingdom and Glory.
